# DRAFT 2014-2018 DELIVERY PROGRAM AND 2014/2015 OPERATIONAL PLAN

## Snapshot

Council's Draft Delivery Program and Operational Plan went on display on Monday 26 May 2014 and will remain on exhibition until Monday 23 June 2014. The budget, as presented, discloses a General Fund surplus of \$9,641 for 2014/2015 financial year. The estimates of income and expenditure have been prepared on the basis of increasing general rate revenue by 2.3% being the maximum allowable under rate pegging legislation. The impact of the 2.3% rate increase has been detailed in the Revenue Policy which also includes a list of fees and charges proposed to be levied.




## Proposed Special Rate Variation – Commencing 1 July 2015

The formation of Council's annual budget continually shows how difficult it is for Council to adequately fund the ongoing maintenance and replacement of Council's infrastructure assets such as roads, bridges and drainage. In response to this challenge, Council considered the concept of a Special Rate Variation during the development of the 2011/2012 budget and since that time Council has been carefully considering a number of options for a Special Rate Variation at various workshops and meetings over the past two to three years.

At the December 2013 Council Meeting it was resolved that Council commence preparations for the implementation of a Special Rate Variation commencing 1 July 2015. Key elements of the proposal are as follows:

- Additional revenue of \$317,250 per annum cumulative over three years (based on an average of \$50 over 6,345 rateable assessments) distributed evenly across all rating categories,
- Properties with the average valuation within each rating category will pay approximately an additional \$50 above rate pegging.

Council's draft budget for the forthcoming 2014/2015 financial year will be based on the approved rate peg increase of 2.3% with forward estimates and Long Term Financial Plan for the 2015/2016 and following years incorporating the proposed Special Rate Variation increase. As stated, the central aim of the Special Rate Variation is to provide Council with additional resources to commit to the ongoing maintenance and renewal of Council's assets, with the key area being the local road network. That being the case, it is proposed that the additional rate income derived from the Special Rate Variation will be committed to increasing expenditure on sealed road resealing (50% of SRV income) and unsealed rural road gravel resheeting (50% of SRV income). The result of this process will see an additional \$951,750 per annum being allocated to these two key areas of Council's road maintenance program from the 2017/2018 financial year.





## NOXIOUS WEEDS ACT 1993



The noxious Weeds Act, adopted in 1993, is managed by the NSW Government's Department of Primary Industries. The Noxious Weeds Act provides legislation specifically for the identification, classification and control of noxious weeds. The Noxious Weeds Act 1993 aims to reduce the negative impact of significant weeds by:

- Preventing the establishment of new weeds;
- Restricting the spread of existing weeds; and
- Reducing the area of existing weeds.

The act is implemented and enforced by the Local Control Authority (LCA) for the area, usually local government (Greater Hume Shire Council). Council's duties include:

- Ensuring owners /occupiers of private land fulfil their obligations under the Noxious Weeds Act 1993.
- Inspection of land within their area in connection with noxious weeds.
- Enforcing the control of noxious weeds as per the control class.
- Weed management on land occupied by the council and on roads in their area.
- Publicity about weeds declared in the area.
- Developing, implementing and coordinating local strategies and policies.

**Private property:** Both owners and occupiers of private land are required to control noxious weeds according to the control class for their area. Where an owner or occupier fails to control weeds on their land, the council may issue a notice for the control of the weed.

**Public land:** Councils and public authorities are required to control noxious weeds on land under their control. Only the Minister has the

power to issue notices to public land managers and councils to control noxious weeds on their land.

**Noxious weed declarations:** Weeds are declared according to LCA boundaries. Control classes are also applied in this manner and specify the action that must be taken in respect to the weed.

- **Class 1: State Prohibited Weeds:** The plant must be eradicated from the land and the land must be kept free of the plant. Control objective is to prevent the introduction and establishment of those plants.
- **Class 2: Regionally Prohibited Weeds:** The plant must be eradicated from the land and the land must be kept free of the plant. Control objective is to prevent the introductions and establishment of those plants in parts of NSW.
- **Class 3: Regionally Controlled Weeds:** The plant must be fully and continuously suppressed and destroyed and where applicable the plant must not be sold, propagated or knowingly distributed. Control objective is to reduce the area and the negative impact of those plants in parts of NSW.
- **Class 4: Locally Controlled Weeds:** The growth of the plant must be managed in a manner that continuously inhibits the ability of the plant to spread. Control objective is to minimise the negative impact of those plants on the economy, community or environment of NSW.
- **Class 5: Restricted Plants:** Plants cannot be sold, propagated or knowingly distributed. Control objective is to prevent the introduction of those plants into NSW, the spread of those plants within NSW or from NSW to another jurisdiction.

## ROAD SAFETY STRATEGIC PLAN

A new Road Safety Strategic Plan for 2014 - 2017 has been developed for Greater Hume, Lockhart and Urana Shire Councils, who currently share a Road Safety Officer. Road Safety Officer, Shelagh Merlin, has conducted research, consultation with stakeholders and a crash data analysis to support the plan. The plan identifies key road safety concerns for the three local government areas and proposes projects to address these concerns. Some projects involve workshops, presentations and community activities, while others may simply involve supporting regional or NSW state initiatives.

Key road safety concerns for Greater Hume, Lockhart and Urana Shires include:

- Nearly three times as many men involved in crashes as women.
- A high number of fatigue and speeding related crashes in comparison with the rest of NSW.
- Drink driving.
- An increasing number of young women involved in crashes.
- Poor compliance in use of restraints among both drivers and passengers.
- An increasing number of motorcycle crashes on local roads.

Addressing these issues is ongoing and involves cooperation and active participation by the Road Safety Officer, Councillors and Council management, Roads & Maritime Services, NSW Police Highway Patrol officers, community health, service organisations and the wider community.

## SWITCH ON FOR SAFETY

Remember to switch on your headlights when driving through Greater Hume Shire where fog is a common feature of winter mornings at this time of the year. **“Using your headlights is smart driving, both during the day and at night as it not only improves your ability to see the road environment in which you are driving but it also makes your vehicle more visible to other road users”**, said Greater Hume, Lockhart and Urana Shire Council Road Safety Officer Shelagh Merlin

**“Drivers should also slow down and increase the distance between their vehicle and the vehicle in front of them when visibility is low”**, Mrs Merlin added. The NSW Road Rules state that a driver is only permitted to use fog lights if driving in fog, mist or other atmospheric condition that restricts visibility.

The road rules also stipulate that the vehicle's headlights, tail lights, number plate lights and any clearance or side marker lights must be visible when driving at night and in poor lighting conditions. Pedestrians and cyclists are also reminded to dress in light and bright clothing or consider adding reflective strips or wearing a safety vest if they are using the road early in the morning or at dusk.

## WORKS PROGRAM FOR WINTER

- 1km of major road works is continuing on Main Road 78 (Olympic Highway) 7km south of The Rock, some delays have been encountered, with 500m of road works completed, and a further 500m of road works to continue for a period of 5-6 weeks.
- 5km of road works on Main Road 125 (Urana Road) has had the final seal and line marking to complete this project.
- Council's road sealing program has been almost completed.
- General maintenance on all roads will be ongoing, gravel re-sheeting has also continued throughout the shire.
- Road works, along with kerb & gutter, drainage and footpath have been completed in Railway Parade, Culcairn and Bowler Street, Holbrook with Adams Street, Jindera to be completed shortly. All are significant projects within these towns.
- Kerb and gutter has been constructed in Bartsch Avenue, Henty along with road works and some minor drainage works, re-instatement of some footpath and driveways is yet to be undertaken, it is anticipated the project will be completed shortly.
- Drainage works has commenced by contractors in Sladen Street, Henty. Council will try to minimise disruption to residents and traffic during this time. To coincide with this project, major road construction is expected to commence 13 May for a period of 2 weeks at the intersection of Sladen and Allan Streets, Henty.

## SQUIRREL GLIDER LAMP

*community shines a light on threatened species*

A community gathering was recently hosted by Wirraminna Environmental Education Centre in Burrumbuttock to launch the new Squirrel Glider Local Area Management Plan (LAMP) project. Some of the speakers at the launch included local landholder Judy Frankenberg, Office of Environment and Heritage (OEH) scientist Matt Cameron, and University of Melbourne ecologist Rodney van der Ree. With funding from the Australian Government, project partners are implementing the LAMP project, which is focussed on the management of threatened squirrel gliders in the Eastern Riverina Local Landscape. Project partners include Murray Local Land Services, OEH, Burrumbuttock landholders, Wirraminna Environmental Education Centre, and West Hume Landcare. The community-driven project aims to secure a viable population of squirrel gliders. The Burrumbuttock squirrel glider population was identified as a significant biodiversity asset by the community in the NSW Murray Biodiversity Management Plan.

Some of the planned activities include community workshops, squirrel glider surveys, mapping, on-ground works to restore or maintain habitats, and the development by community of a map-based management plan for the population. Surveying of squirrel gliders on landholders' properties and vegetation mapping are well underway. Around 20-30 landholders in a 10 km radius of Burrumbuttock are involved so far. *Here is an extract from Three Shires and Their Council's, Chapter 2, Meeting the Challenges of the Great War, author Mr Bruce Pennay, October 2006. "In a war-stressed nation, the newly created shires and municipalities emerged as part of the apparatus of government with which to prosecute the war. Councils were good rallying points for mobilising resources, rallying support and even, it seemed, for engaging with the enemy. The war magnified the role of local government organisations as community representatives and leaders. All the councils in the region adapted to the new tasks expected of them. But they were also thrust into advocacy of the unpopular cause of conscription, which proved to be contentious and divisive. Local government had a special place in fundraising, and several mayors launched patriotic funds.*

Members of Hume Shire Council were quick to donate ten guineas, each from their own pockets, to the Albury Mayor's Patriotic Fund. Hermann Paech, the President of Culcairn Shire, just as quickly organised meetings at Culcairn, Walla Walla, Walbundrie and Bulgandra to declare the people's loyalty and to raise funds for the Sydney Lord Mayor's Fund.' Shires were thrust into organising national fundraising activities, for example for Belgian Relief, then, for a special Australia Day and, later, for an Allies Day. Often the Presidents called public meetings to galvanise community action or councillors were asked to form committees. Small and large communities

responded well, seizing on all kinds of occasions to raise money for the wounded, comforts for those at the front or for the war effort more generally. They sold buttons and badges, ran street stalls with home-made produce and bazaars with household bric-a-brac. Albury Banner had an Art Union for four blocks of land at Howlong donated by the proprietor; Jindera sold loads of wood; the Licensed Victuallers Race Club raffled a racehorse; congregations donated special collections. People organised entertainments: Germanton held a fancy dress ball and a football match; Lankeys Creek a euchre party; Talmalmo a dance; Brocklesby a concert; Bowna varied a sports carnival with a draught horse race; Henty arranged a regatta on the Doodle Cooma Swamp."

### Major Events (with particular relevance to Australia) - June to September 1914 (source: Australian War Memorial)

- 28 June 1914** - Assassination of Archduke Franz Ferdinand, heir to the throne of Austria-Hungary (Germany's close ally) and his wife Sophie, by 19 year old nationalist Gavrilo Princip in Sarajevo. This triggers a diplomatic crisis which soon spreads around the world.
- 4 August 1914** - Great Britain declared war on Germany. Australia pledged a force of 20,000.
- 5 August 1914** - A gun crew stationed at Fort Nepean on the Mornington Peninsula in Victoria, Australia, fired across the bow of German cargo steamer *SS Pfalz*. This is the first shot fired by British forces in WWI.
- 10 August 1914** - Voluntary recruitment for Australia Imperial Force (AIF) started.
- 11 September 1914** - German New Guinea and nearby German-ruled island territories seized by Australian navy.

## CALLING ALL LIBRARY LOVERS - PROTECT THE FUTURE OF YOUR LIBRARY

Greater Hume Shire Libraries, part of Riverina Regional Library Service, is asking local library lovers to join a statewide call to stop the ongoing reduction in funding from successive NSW State Governments and protect the future of their library. Greater Hume Shire Libraries is part of Riverina Regional Library Services (RRL).

Libraries are often the most well-used and valued public facilities in a community, but the ability of the Greater Hume Shire to maintain service levels at Culcairn, Henty, and Holbrook Libraries may be at risk due to deteriorating State funding, according to Mr Robert Knight, the Executive Director of the RRL. "Expenditure on public libraries from the state has decreased as a proportion of total public library expenditure from 23% in 1980 to only 7% in 2013," Mr Knight said. This has and will continue to impact on the ability of local libraries to meet the needs of their communities.

### This is an historic issue that has now reached a crisis point.

RRL is seeking signatures on a petition requesting increased and sustainable library funding to be tabled in the Lower House of the State Government. These petitions are available at all Greater Hume Shire local public libraries and customers service offices. Our local public library plays a very important part in our community life. Libraries bring people together, facilitate learning, connect us with information and ideas, and provide a wonderful source of recreational pleasure. Libraries have evolved to become vibrant hubs that are seen as safe, welcoming spaces that serve a very important community-building role. There is no doubt libraries improve the quality of life of everyone who uses them.
