A local legend is honoured

The Hume Football League recently inducted Ken Lindner into the League's Hall of Fame.

Burrumbuttock ruck-forward Ken Lindner made his senior debut in 1958 under coach Keith Thomas where he initially played for six seasons until the end of 1963.

In 1964 Lindner had a brief stint with North Albury before returning to Burrumbuttock in 1965 before having a further two seasons with the Hoppers in the O&M in 1966 and '67.

He was appointed coach of Burrumbuttock in 1968 for one season and spent the remainder of his career at the club until his retirement in 1980.

Lindner captured the only flag of his career in 1969 under coach Bill Barton and was vice-captain of the Swans.

He also suffered grand final heartache in 1973, '77 and '79.

Lindner won the Azzi medal in 1962 and was a triple best and fairest with the Swans and the League's leading goalkicker in 1978 with 71 majors.

He is a life member of the Swans and both an O&M and Hume League representative.

Lindner amassed more than 400-matches combined for Burrumbuttock and North Albury and has had stints as thirds coach and on the recruiting committee for the Swans.

BURUMBUTTOCK COMMUNITY FORUM

JUNE MEETING REPORT

The Community Forum meeting was held on 24th June 2024.

Present were Cr Ashley Linder, Fe Coleman, Elizabeth Newton, Tony Marshall, Marion Vile. Apologies were received from Cr Jenny O'Neill, Saedie Kryzwnicki, Barry Mott, Sam Marshall.

The Forum AGM was postponed due to insufficient numbers in attendance.

Matters raised at the meeting:

- Request to Council to spray and whipper snip Urana Road section of Burrum walking track as major upgrade may not start for some time.
- Gibson Drive Subdivision /Effluent system – projected to be completed during summer 24/25.
- Schmidt Park Tourist sign – Preferred design has been sent to Emily Jones at Council who will organise a worker to measure up the size needed.
- Electric vehicle charging station – Tony Marshall explained that it would be cost-prohibitive to install a charging station at Wirraminna due to need for a three-phase upgrade at that location, and that the preferred location would be the Public Hall. It was decided to shelve this idea at present due to costs.
- New Community Facebook page launched to link locals more easily, especially newcomers to town: 'Burrumbuttock Community Link Together'. There were concerns expressed that it is a big responsibility to monitor. Currently Marion Vile, Andrea Dunstan and Sue Saunders are admin people.
- Extra speed limit warning road sign needed Howlong side of hill leading into township due to safety concerns. 50km ahead warning sign needs to be relocated. Concerns also about stop signs not being observed at main intersection, with several near misses. Maybe have a graduated white line leading up to intersection with 'Stop sign ahead' warning.
- Request to be sent to Council traffic committee regarding both these issues.
- Burrumbuttock 150th Celebrations – Elizabeth Newton is requesting clothes for vintage fashion parade. Sub-committees need to keep working on their planned activities. Would be good to get someone to get grants sorted.

No budgets have been set for 150th.

Plan: Keep posting updates in Bulletin including suggestions from sub-committees.

Wirraminna News

It has been a very cold July, but we have had rain, so the plants are growing, and there are flowers. Correas, Hakeas, Banksias, and early Wattles are providing splashes of colour. There is also colour on the ground and on fallen timber, with (mostly) orange fungus fruiting bodies. We are very pleased with our new Banksia, the Possum Banksia, flowering for the first time in the Art and Craft bed. The Seed Production Area has done well this year with seeds of more than 20 species being harvested for storage, to be used in the Burrum Woodland or to supply Nurseries, The Local Land Services Seed Bank, or other keen growers of our local wildflowers.

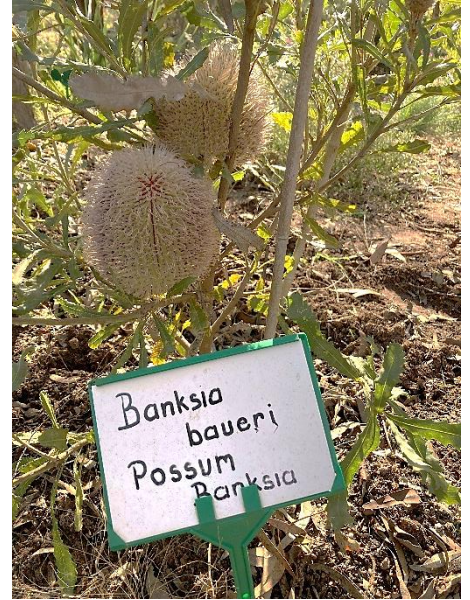
The gabion builders are still hard at it. The gabions on the garden edges really enhance the appearance of the beds, as well as providing safe habitat for small lizards and a variety of insects and spiders. These are such important members of our park diversity. Filling gabions with stone is a big task, and great progress was made last week with the help of students from St Paul's College. Last Wednesday morning 20 Year 9 students, and in the afternoon, 14 Year 10 students, arrived and rapidly filled the new gabions around the Indjemarra bed. Some students also spread mulch, found, and removed Bridal Creeper plant on the dam bank, and transplanted Wallaby Grass in the SPA. These groups will be making many more visits this term, so we are very grateful for their help.



A new nest box has been put up on the edge of the verandah roof at the Discovery Centre. There was already a box designed for bats, but recently a pair of Pardalotes was noticed exploring its suitability as a nest. So, Trevor Jacob put up a special Pardalote box and we are hoping they will approve.
