As we reach the end of 2024, Wirraminna is looking good. Despite the dry season and with the help of a lot of watering, the growth that occurred in the last couple of wet years has left the garden beds in good condition and a lot of the newer plants have put on a great display during the spring. In addition to the flourishing gardens, our volunteer group is also thriving. We have been very happy to welcome quite a few new workers, some very regulars, others less so but always so welcome when they can spare us some time on a Wednesday. We have also had a number of visits by students from St Paul's College, who in the last few weeks have spread gravel on the paths. On their last visit we let them off and they went fishing in the dam. We have also been sourcing and developing large feature logs and constructing more nestboxes and putting them into place.

The Seed Production area is moving into seed collecting time. To help get the weeding finished, we were very pleased to have

support from 4 members of the Local Land Services Seed Bank team who put in a good mornings work. Our seed production capacity is becoming appreciated by the revegetation teams, as they start to acknowledge that the biodiversity of our natural vegetation depends greatly on the ground cover plants, grasses and wildflowers, which so far has not been recognised. We are about the only group that has been growing and collecting seed from these species and without seed they cannot be included in revegetation projects. We have been included in a couple of bids for large funding opportunities, so are hoping that more support will result.

A highlight was the celebration of 10 years since Petaurus Education Group was established. Chairperson Adrian Wells thanked all for their help and presented Certificate of Appreciation to Darryl Jacob and Stacee Bell for their service. Owen Dunlop and his wife Narelle travelled from suburban Melbourne to attend and renew old friendships.

A major change to the Wirraminna management has been Darryl's retirement from the position of Chair of the Wirraminna Committee, handing over to Tony Marshall. It is impossible to overstate the contribution Darryl has made to making Wirraminna what it is today. From the very beginning of an idea, Darryl has been the one person who has made it all happen. Anything that needed doing, however large or small the task, Darryl was there to make sure it was done or did it himself. We had to be quick if we wanted to relieve him of some of the work. Thank you, Darryl, for all you have done. Though we notice that you are not slowing down much!

This year, instead of a Christmas dinner party, we had a Christmas morning tea/lunch which was very successful and included most of the volunteers who have worked with us during the year.

375g Currants 375g Raisins 340g Pitted Prunes 1 cup port 250 butter chopped 1tsp Vanilla 1 cup Dark Brown Sugar 4 Eggs 1 Orange – finely grated rind and juice of orange 1/3 cup Treacle 1¹/₂ cup Flour ¹/₂ cup Flour Self Raising **1tbls Mixed Spice 1tbls Nutmeg** 1tbls Cinnamon 250g Glacied Cherries 250g Walnut halves 200g Dark Chocolate chopped Extra ¼ cup of port

Method

Place currants and raisins in large bowl. Cut up prunes into 1/4s and place in blow. Add port and stand for at least 2 hours, stirring occasionally. Chop butter and beat in electric mixer until light and fluffy. Add vanilla. Beat in sugar until mixture is light and creamy. Add eggs one at a time, beating well after each addition. Add to fruit mixture and mix well, even get your clean

hands into it.

Preheat oven to 160 degrees. Line the base and side of tin with 2 layers of brown paper. Bringing it 5cm above the tin.

School makes provision for fire danger period

Dear Community Member

I am writing to you to inform you of our emergency management arrangements for the upcoming bush fire danger period.

Our school is in a bushfire prone area and is identified as Category 1 by the NSW Department of Education's bushfire risk register.

As a community user of our facilities, it is important you know what to do in an emergency and have a planning place. This is a requirement of the Work Health and Safety Act 2011.

This means our school will be non-operational when the NSW Rural Fire Service declares cata-strophic fire danger ratings for Greater Hume Shire local NSW Fire Area or as directed by the NSW Department of Education in consultation with emergency services due to local bushfire activity or in higher risk conditions.

Fire danger ratings do not mean there will be a bushfire, but rather the weather conditions pose a high risk if a fire were to start in the area. The measure is proactive to ensure staff, students, and the community remain safe.

Additionally, our school may be made non-operational due to localised bushfire activity or due to significant deterioration in fire danger ratings. These decisions are made on information provided by the NSW Rural Fire Service.

We will inform the school community after 4 pm if there is a change to the operational status of the school for the following day. If the school is non-operational, you cannot access the school for your ap-proved community use activity on these days.

We recommend you download the NSW Education Parent App and select to monitor advice from our school, which will send you notifications if the school is non-operational.

We also recommend you stay up to date with bushfire and grassfire activity by using the Hazards Near Me (set a watch zone for your school area) and by monitoring local media.

Fire danger ratings indicate the consequences of a fire if one was to start. The higher the fire danger, the more dangerous the conditions. The measure is proactive to ensure staff, students and the community-ty remain safe.

It is important you undertake appropriate planning and monitor bushfire conditions during the bush-fire season and be ready to act when required. If there is bushfire activity in the vicinity of the school while you are there, you should contact the school during school hours or if after hours, ring Triple Zero (000) and seek advice.

With 82 entries, competitors and their horses are making the journey from WA, SA, Tasmania, VIC, NSW,

QLD to compete along with an international carriage driver from the Netherlands. At the higher levels they will be battling it out for the prestigious "Prince Philip, His Royal Highness the Duke of Edinburgh Perpetual Memorial Trophy", for other competitors there are the Dominiak & Camp; Carbery Carriages Trophy and the top Teams Trophy.

The event was designed to be the carriage driving equivalent of ridden eventing except that the horses are pulling a carriage and being driven by a competitor. It involves 3 phases, the first phase, the Dressage, is performed in an enclosed arena of 100m x 40m. The drivers complete a set of movements in that arena and are judged on their accuracy, the horse's obedience and willingness and their presentation. Phase 2, Cones follows the dressage. This

is where the horses are driven through multiple of pairs of cones

which have a ball placed top of each cone. The cones are set only centimetres wider than the carriage wheels so that drivers must drive accurately but also must drive quick enough not to incur time penalties. Penalties are also given if balls are knocked from the cones.

The third phase Marathon is held on Sunday. This is driven over several kilometres whilst drivers have to manoeuvre and negotiate obstacles on course, with their horses or ponies. These obstacles are placed in a row and all spectators will see the whole event from just one location whilst sitting under the shade of some beautiful big old Elm trees.

In addition, do your Christmas shopping at the same time by visiting the Battle of The Border Marketplace, open over the three days.

Feeling hungry, we offer food vendors selling delicious comfort food. Bring the whole family, sit under the huge trees and enjoy the spectacular, none stop action, something everyone will enjoy. Bring a chair, your hat and sunscreen. See you here!!!

CONVENORS OF MEETING FORCED TO RETIRE

PRIVATELY HIRED HALL CAPTURED BY APPARENTLY ORGANIZED DISTURBERS

"LEST WE FORGET' CIRCULAR CAUSES FURTHER TROUBLE

A disgraceful scene occurred at Burrumbuttock on Saturday night when an apparently organized party of district Labour supporters took charge of a privately hired hall and forced the convenor of the meeting of district residents to retire.

Although warned by the police that they were virtually trespassing the disturbers refused to all the convenors to speak and elect their own chairman, in the person of Mr. G.A. Hall, without any authority other than his own statement that the meeting was a public one. Mr. Bell attempted to address the gathering, while Mr. J. H. Lindner vainly attempted to point out that they must either remain neutral or leave the hall. Still declining to take notice Mr. Bell was then told by the solitary policeman present that he had no right to speak from the platform, but he remained there until some of the convenors attempted to forcibly eject him.

This was the signal for an ugly rush from the audience, who rose as one man to the attack. In the resultant struggle Mr. Bell was roughly handled and received a cut on the face from a blow. Forced from the platform he again took charge of the meeting in the body of the hall, and the convenors retired and left the disturbers to their own devices. The meeting, which was called to express indignation at the issue of a circular entitled "Lest We Forget," to favor the candidature of Mr. Parker Moloney (Labour) at the recent Federal elections, was convened Messrs. J. H. Lindner, Alex. Schultz, Albert Moll, W Briese, A. Funk, and W Odewahn. The circular complained of reads as follows: -

"As you know, the Federal election takes place next Saturday, and it vitally concerns every person of German descent like ourselves.

"No German descendant worth his salt can forget that both Nationalists and Country parties voted in Parliament during the war to treat us worse than blackfellows by taking our vote from us. They also threw many Australian-born citizens of German origin into internments camps without even telling them what they were charged with. "It is painful to find some German descendants today asking to 'let by-gones be by-gones.' Mr. Bruce and Mr. Page do not say that, for their Government will not to this day all a German national to enter Australia. "Chinamen and the scum of earth can come to Australia, but the National-Country Party Government will not allow a soul from Germany to come here. Of course, they are begging for our votes, but every descendant with a spark of manhood in him should not forget to wipe out this insult to the country of our forefathers on next Saturday.

"Mr. Parker Moloney and his party always stood for fair play for us. Besides he has been the best friend the farmers and the people generally, ever had, and we appeal to you to be fair to him by voting as shown here under: -

3. Campbell./ 2. Miers./1. Moloney.

Beneath the circular were printed the signatures of A. Heppner, E. G Wenke and H.A Paech.

It was supported from the platform by Messrs, Parch, Heppner and Parker Moloney, M.P. for Hume, but Mr Wenke stated that last week in the press that he had not signed it or had any connection with it.

A large number of people of German descent look upon the circular as an attempt to stir up racial hatred for the political advantage of the Labour party, and the meeting was called at Burrumbuttock on Saturday night to express indignation.

When the convenors arrived for the opening of the meeting it was found that a considerable number of Labour supporters had arrived from Albury, Hume Weir, Walla and Walbundrie. They were almost equal in numbers to those who had gathered to carry on the advertised objects of the meeting. Such a crowd had never before gathered at Burrumbuttock.

The meeting was advertised to take place at 8.30 p.m., but as some of the convenors had not arrived at that time, the doors were not opened. At about five minutes to nine Mr. W S. McNiven, of the Albury High School, Mr Mc Niven, secretary of the local branch of the A.L.P, succeeded with several other persons in entering from the back of the hall. At the same time Mr. G.A. Bell with others shouted and knocked loudly on the front door, and Mr. McNiven immediately rose from his seat and opened the hall to them.

In about two minutes the hall was filled, not with district residents but with Labour sympathisers from Albury, Hume Weir and surrounding districts. Mr J. H. Pearce (Hume Weir) calmly nominated Mr. G. A Bell to the chair of the meeting. Mr J. H. Lindner, one of the convenors, who had hired the hall, and who had been elected to chair by them came forward and explained that the meeting had been called for a special purpose. "Those who are not in favour of that purpose, must either remain neutral or go outside," he said. "It is not a public meeting," he continued, "and if you have come here to disturb it, I must ask the constable".

The rest of Mr. Lindner's speech was drowned in the storm of boos, hisses and cat-calls that broke forth. Each time the men of the platform attempted to speak, several men in the front seats who appeared to be leading the disturbers, were seen to urge those around them to continue the noise and drown the words.

Mr. J.E. Jelbart attempted to speak but he was also unsuccessful. The noise only ceased when Mr. H. Paech, on of the signatories of the circular was seen to be on his feet. When the tumult had dies down somewhat, he shouted. "As one who is going to be charged with something, will you give me the right to reply." A wild outburst of cheering greeted the question, and wild pandemonium reigned for a further few minutes, Mr. G. A Bell mounted the platform.

He and Mr. Lindner then attempted to address the crowd together. Finding it useless the latter called on the constable to remove Mr. Bell, but this was impossible in the face of over one hundred angry supporters. However, Constable Bowern (Jindera), who was the only policeman present at the time, handled the situation in the only possible way. He conversed quietly with Mr. Lindner and then told Mr. Bell that he had no right on the platform of a hall that had been hired privately for a specific purpose.

Mr Bell did not move, however, and some of the convenors attempted to remove him forcibly. The audience immediately rushed the stage, and a scuffle ensued, in which Mr. Bell was handled roughly. A blow, struck during the general melee, laid open his cheek and he finally took his place on the floor of the Hall and from that position presided over the Labour gathering.

Finding that it was useless to attempt to discuss the business of the meeting in the face of such opposition, the convenors left the hall and left the gatherings to its own discussions. A Labour meeting then took place and several resolutions were passed. While this meeting was in progress the lights of the hall were turned off, but the gathering struck matches until hurricane lanterns were procured. After a considerable amount of speech making, to which there was no opposition, the hall was cleared.

Burrumbuttock's isolated position makes police protection difficult to obtain, and only one constable arrived to answer to a call for additional protection. He came from Walla, and did not arrive until the trouble was over. Considering all the circumstances, it is remarkable that harm did not befall some of the residents and had the locals not been wisely content to remain passive the disturbance might have been more serious results.

After the crowd had dispersed, Mr J.H. Lindner stated that the obstructive tactics of the labour party had produced the most disgraceful exhibition of political intolerance ever witnessed in the district. "I have been in the district all my life," he declared "and we have never before had anything approaching it in disorderliness. The Labour party may believe they have scored a victory, but I fancy that a large number of people who saw the supporters of the party at their worst will recognise the wisdom of the people of Australia in having refused to place them in power. I am sure that tonight's exhibition will make the people think seriously. If this is a sample of fair play and freedom of speech as understood by the Labour party, the people of Albury district now know that these privileges are recognised only as they affect one section of the people. Tonight, does not settle the matter. I shall ascertain where we stand as the conveners of a meeting called for a specific purpose, and for which we paid a rent of which other people secured the advantage. The principal resolution was intended to express our indignation that a circular calculated to arouse racial hatred should have been issued for party political purposes. We further desired to express our allegiance to the King, our support of British institutions and our sincere wish for cultivation of happy and trusting relationships between the people of German descent and those of British stock."

Another meeting will be held tomorrow night at Burrumbuttock, when residents will have an opportunity of discussing the matter fully.
