

Following the success of last year's inaugural Burrumbuttock Endurance Horse Ride, planning is well advanced for this year's ride. It will be held on Saturday and Sunday, 29th and 30th March.

Last year, an estimated 600 riders and support staff took part, and this year at least the same are expected. Overseas riders will compete, along with others from the three Eastern States. And the usual contingent of horse buyers from Dubai will be present.

In addition, several junior riders will utilise Burrum's ride as practice for an F.E.I. event in Romania later this year.

On Saturday, there'll be a 20 klms fun ride for anyone who



wants a relaxing ride with enjoyable company are encouraged to enter, while a 40 klms ride is aimed at anyone who'd like to have a feeling for endurance riding. These rides kick off at 11am.

The main events, starting at 4am Sunday, comprise on two international sections and one Australian division. There will be a 120 klms 2-star F.E.I. (international) ride, a 100 klms 1star F.E.I. event; and a 120 klm (Australian), elevator. A.R.A A.R.A.riders who do not complete the 120 klms, can retire after 80 klms or 100 klms and receive acknowledgement certificates and tokens.

Event organiser and co-ordinator Tony Marshall said this year's ride would be over the same cover-leaf course as last year, unless rain sees some of the paddocks in crop. In this case, there would be more use of roadways.

The course will be through the church property, cemetery roadway, and the properties of Ben White, Rod Frohling, John Zeibath, Peter and Nicola Lawrence, Richard and Jenny Molesworth, Brad and Fiona Schultz, and Ashley and Rebecca Lindner.

Tony said all the paperwork had been completed and council approvals received, leaving the practical work on the ground to be done. For this, he relies on community support and a small army of volunteers for Saturday and Sunday.

Pre-summer clean up finally underway

On Tuesday, February 21, Essential Energy notified locals that it intended to conduct 'Pre-Summer Bushfire Inspections' using drones and helicopters.

The inspections form part of part of their Energy's Bushfire Risk and Network Management plans to help ensure the safety and reliability of the network. It all sounds reassuring apart from the "Pre-Summer' bit, since we are more than half way through summer.

However, land based inspections and remedial works were carried out in Burrum back in September.

"Aerial inspections help us to identify faults or potential hazards with electrical equipment or vegetation encroachment across our network. They form part of our ongoing maintenance program that helps us keep our network safe and reliable for our customers and communities.

"The program involves two inspection types: 1: an aerial patrol using an aircraft (like a helicopter) flying at a low altitude (below 500ft), 2: drone inspection supported by a ground patrol.

"Technology is supporting changes to our bushfire inspection program through the greater use of drones.

"Using drones to inspect our poles and wires is more efficient, has a low impact and is safer. Low flying aircraft are used as part of the inspection program in areas where drones are unable to operate."

Biodiversity update

In last October's edition of the Bulletin I wrote about how the biodiversity in our yard had changed over the 35 years I've lived in Burrumbuttock. Some species have disappeared, others arrived, some beneficial others are pests.



One creature I missed mentioning was the Eastern Banjo Frog, which I had always thought was a toad, probably because they're an ugly looking and squishy amphibian. When I identified them for this story, I discovered they were frogs, I was disappointed for the frogs which are usually more attractive.

Frogs have smooth, with slimish skin, toads have dry, warty skin. Frogs have long legs, for jumping. Toads have shorter legs and prefer crawling. Frogs usually have big, bulging eyes, while toads' eyes are more subtle. However, toads are a sub-classification of frogs, meaning that all toads are frogs, but not all frogs are toads.

Anyway, one Saturday, 35 years ago I dug the holes for the house stumps, and the following Saturday began putting them in. But every second hole had a toad (frog) in the bottom, and while I was tempted to incarcerate the creatures with the stumps, I decided to be more humane.

Then, for the next few years they'd turn up when digging the gardens or moving rubbish, but now they seemed to have gone. I say 'seemed' because I've not seen one for many years but have regularly heard some honking in the dam, which my research suggests might be them. And there's been egg froth among the reeds.

There have been a couple of temporary arrivals in the last two or three years. The first was a host of small black frogs in the grass and lawn, which I've been unable to identify since around half a dozen species seem to fit their description. They've been so prolific they jump from in front of an approaching lawn mower in their tens. This year they've disappeared.

Then we had an infestation of white moths, or butterflies, for a couple or springs and summers. The butterflies are the ones with white spots on their wings.

Another comment in the October article mentioned that a snake had not been seen for more than five years, but that has changed. Just before Christmas Estrella was wheeling the barrow past the fernery when she leaned down to pick up a stick. Oops, it moved, it was a brown snake four to five foot long.

They looked at each other briefly before Brownie turned back into the fernery. At that size, we assumed (or hoped) he was male and would move on searching for a female. But no! Twice in the next few days, in the late afternoon, he was back on the lawn beside the fernery.

A week later, Estrella was gardening at the other side of the house, pushing plants back into shape when a tail below her disappeared between the stones. A little further along the garden, Brownie reappeared, and for an electric moment, they stared at each other once again. When Estrella stepped back, Brownie slithered away.

Then, just a few days ago the couple met yet again. Estrella was in the driveway stamping soil from her boots when Brownie slithered from under the car, and without hesitating this time, proceeded under the house.

Over the years, we've seen a good share of snakes here, the largest was as thick as an arm, and seven or eight feet long but I don't killed them any more. However, ion this circumstance I've taken precautions and retrieved the compression bandages from the back of the cupboard, and put them handy.

When I was young the general attitude to wild life was considerably different to today, and in our family snakes and wedge tail eagles were to be eliminated.

My first experience with snakes was at the age of about seven, sitting in the back of the car coming home from somewhere, when suddenly there was a screech of tyres, we were all thrown forward, and Dad announced 'snake'. We didn't stop to assess the damage, we just continued home as if nothing had happened.

A few years later, again the car, with Grandad aboard this time, there was ANOTHER SNAKE and since the road was gravel, and it was been late, it escaped the skidding manoeuvre. But we stopped, Grandad got out, selected a stick from the side of the road and nonchalantly walked up to the snake and killed it.

As a teenager, still at school, I used to go to South Australia during the Christmas holidays and help my Mallee farming cousins with the harvest.

(In those days, the grain was still bagged and I learnt to sew them, with my uncle keeping a keen eye on my workmanship. For some reason, he watched me closely worried I might cheat on the 13 stitches per bag. Fancy that!)

On one occasion, we were driving through the stubble when out the side window, I saw something. STOP SNAKE. I flew out the door, swung around to the back of the ute, grabbed an iron pipe, and charged for the snake.

When saw me coming and realising I was faster than he was, he turned and attacked. Within range, he jumped at me about waist height, surprising me, to say the least. Thankfully, the pipe won.

Over the next few years, I killed a few more, including a Black snake which I decided would make a fine snakeskin belt. I skinned it inside out, filled the skin with sand to dry, but never continued with the project. Pity!

At some point, I matured realising there are far more dangers in life than snakes, including driving into Lavington, but I agree they should be dealt with if there are young children about.

Some people stick the rule of skidding over them, and recently car stopped abruptly in from of home. The driver jumped out "Got a shovel mate, there's a snake. I tried to run over him but the ABS brakes won't skid".

"No mate, we don't kill them".

Son, James took a shovel anyway and hunted the snake over the road.

That was the start of printing being done by Conway Printing, because the complete Bulletin was totally produce on the computer and that was also the end of paste up.

There was always a form of advertising in the early years, but as the years past, there was more and more advertising and also Shire information being placed in the Burrumbuttock Bulletin. I guess you could say that the Pulltine came of age.

The amount of advertising increased and this helped to pay for the printing by the Jindera printer.

There were always copies put in the Jindera IGA Supermarket, which was generally delivered by myself or Brian. Many comments heard in Jindera from various people preferred the Bulletin to their own local paper.

Which of course I always felt that that was a compliment to all those concerned in the presentation and work put in.

The Bulletin continues to improve and I always look forward to the next edition.

Over the years, the different members of the Burrumbuttock community who have put in hours to produce it should be proud of their local paper/news letter.

Printing is now done by the local pre-school on their printer, the modern printers are excellent and produce great colour and photographic images.
