HENTY- CULCAIRN PROBUS

Our meeting was at Henty. Our President Warren welcomed us and our two visitors Vivien and Neil. Alison Schuster was our five minute speaker and told us of growing up on a farm with four older brothers. Alison loved sports. The family built tennis courts, and there were tennis parties and singing around the pianola after tea. She remembers dances and being able to see the birds and wild flowers in the swamp. Warren presented Alison with our Probus pen as a thankyou token for sharing her happy memories.

After morning tea we had music and singing and we can now sing about Kookaburra living in an old gum tree, as a round. Our main speaker was Daniel Hore, who came with young people from the NDIS support service, Next Step, with whom he works. Daniel is grandson of our member Alice Hore. Daniel has been to the base camp at Mount Everest. He turned a boyhood dream into a real adventure. The physical training involved three times per week with back pack loaded, walking at The Rock for eight months. We learned of the pre organising of evening meals at tea houses, mainly vegetarian meals, sleeping bags were a necessity, and water had to be carried, and then there was learning to breathe the mountain air. We saw photos of the little airport and the amazing mountains, the people carrying enormous loads and the swing bridges where working yaks had priority. Daniel noted the caring and helping nature of the people and the way children valued education. School had a dirt floor with perhaps two hours of lessons and then back to work. The walking seemed to be about ten kilometres per day to the next tea house and past Numchee Village, a Market town. The highest place of worship is Den Bo Che, where there were less trees and a need to drink six litres of water per day or succumb to altitude sickness. Potatoes were grown on farms and there were still seven or eight days of walking to get to the Everest base camp. There has been a recycling business established to clean up after tourists and employ Nepalese people. For Daniel this trip to Everest guided by San Deep, has been amazing, and we have shared the terror of plane flight in the mountains and the learning to control body temperature and getting to the base camp to see 50 to 60 people in various stages of coping with the altitude. The base camp was around minus 25degrees and very easy to get frost bite. The ground was rocky and there is a memorial site for people who died on climbs. Back at the airport before the trip home, Daniel had hot chocolate to celebrate and a need to be involved in helping people in his own community. Now Daniel wants to do walks in Australia before perhaps going back to Nepal. Richard presented Daniel with our token of appreciation, the Probus pen. Our next meeting is to be Wednesday February 12th at Culcairn. Our speaker Is to be a surprise for us all. Hope you will join us.

WHY RECORD HISTORY-PART 4

<u>1956 Many Friendships</u>. By active participation in Jaycees, members formed many friendships and the confidence to become a voice in the affairs of their community. It was the greatest force for good in Asian countries. Types of things Jaycees undertook included road safety and courtesy campaigns, flood relief, book drives for troops, public speaking and debating, firewood for aged folk, white elephant auctions, trade promotion and work for the betterment of the community depending on the size of the town and how active members were. It was one of the finest brotherhoods one could find, and it was not only for businessmen, but for every young man who felt he had a place in his community.

Provisional office-bearers were elected as follow: - President Mr Bruce Schultz, vice-president Mr Harry Templeton, Secretary Mr Ron Gardiner, treasurer Mr Ray Shelton, councillors, Messrs Jim Crawley, Glen Schultz, Alan Wilson, Alan Kerle, Donald Lowe, and Noel Wood. In offering their congratulation Mr Peter Roth, president of Albury Jaycees, gave an assurance "that there was no catch in it". Tom Gardiner, secretary of Albury spoke on what Jaycees can offer to Culcairn and what Culcairn can offer to Jaycees. – Date of first meeting was set for Wednesday 8th August 1956.

<u>THE CHAPTER'S FIRST PROJECT</u>. Sections of the blue granite border of the towns 250-yard median strip gardens required repair. The new Junior Chamber sought permission from the Shire Council to undertake replacement of broken sections and to improve the walk throughs.

Permission was granted and became the chapters first community project.

The project committee secured replacement granite rock from Hurricane Hill Quarry and over a couple of weekends renewed damaged sections, cementing bluestone rocks back in.

Then to improve safety especially at night, painted the granite bordered walk-through rocks white. Whilst doing this trimmed and removed the annual falling Palm tree branches creating a very fresh outlook for Balfour Street.



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
