More help from respite centre

Avondale Place continues to evolve with the demands for respite and to provide support for those with disabilities. All the units are currently occupied, and it is exciting to see the facilities being well utilised.

The number of people accessing the Avondale Place for respite continues to grow, with several ongoing repeat bookings locked in for the rest of the year. Mercy Connect, the service provider, operates the daily operations and all inquiries are to be directed to them.

The Henty Trust and *The Next Step*, disability service providers based in Henty, have collaborated to provide additional opportunities for members of the local communities.

Since July The Next Step,

with financial support and the provision of a venue by the Henty Respite Trust, has commenced a program called "Road to Independence". The program involves two stages: "Learn to Grow" and "Time to Move". Stage 1 – Learn to Grow is the program currently in place and as participants move forward, they will have the opportunity to consider Stage 2 – Time to Move, as appropriate to their needs..

The Next Step will use the Avondale Place facilities midweek for two nights to allow its participants to experience living away from home and develop additional living skills. It will involve a rotation of two to three participants each week.

This is an exciting development for all parties, and we look forward to the greater community being more involved in the opportunities for the participants.

Henty Respite is keen to note and report on the employment of locals in Avondale Place, both by Mercy Connect and *The Next Step*.

The Henty Respite Trust plan to hold its AGM on Thursday, August 29, venue and time to be confirmed.

The Henty Local Health Advisory Committee (LHAC) wants as many people as possible to be trained in first aid and has decided to subsidise more first-aid training.

Therefore, first-aid training will be offered on Monday, August 19, from 6pm to 9pm at a cost of \$70 per person (normally \$120 but Henty LHAC will pay a \$50 subsidy for each attendee).

Qualified local trainer Claire Lawson will provide the training at the Henty Library and it is suitable for people wanting their basic first aid certificate or to renew their existing qualification, which expires after three years. All people over the age of 16 are invited to register and this is ideal training for young people wanting future work in life guarding, childcare or aged care.

Cheap travel for seniors

Most seniors and pensioners know NSW has a daily \$2.50 fare for rail, bus, and ferry journeys in the greater Sydney area. However, did you know that Henty seniors and pensioners can access a \$2.50 train trip through NSW Train Link. The Country Pensioner Excursion ticket is an affordable one-day economy ticket for eligible pensioners and seniors to travel in regional NSW and the ACT.

With a valid NSW Seniors or pensioner concession card, you can enjoy great value travel between regional towns and centres on a Country Pensioner Excursion ticket. Unfortunately, the excursion fare cannot be used for travel within the area bounded by and including Sydney, Nowra, Moss Vale, Lithgow, Muswellbrook, Maitland, Karuah and Booral.

For \$2.50 you can book an economy class seat on a NSW Trainlink Regional train and coach service. You need to book seven days or less in advance. Conditions apply. When you book online simply select 'Country Pensioner Excursion Fare' from the concession type dropdown list to pay just \$2.50.

This fare would allow a Hentyite to travel to Canberra and back for \$5 or to go one-way to places like Goulburn, Parkes or Mildura.

Beanie Festival success

The opening night of the Beanie Festival at the Henty Craft Gallery was a great success with lots of punch, wine and nibbles served to a happy gathering in a buzz of excitement with the amazing variety of colour, shapes and sizes of beanies. Lots of Guylian sea shell chocolates and blue first prize ribbons were given to the winners. The youngest knitter was a nine-year-old boy, the oldest a crocheter 96 years old who decorated many beanies with flowers, shells, boats, lighthouses and fish. In between, an 87-year-old male who knitted 50 beanies though his friend did the basks and picked up several stitches.

The judge, from Albury who won the 2023 Beanie Festival in Alice Springs, had a wonderful time choosing and trying beanies on her friend's head.

Troy Hanckel, a former chaplain at the Seafarers Mission, spoke about the mission with sea shanty music playing in the background.

A total of 1,005 beanies were received for the festival with Dusty Wishart, from Wagga Wagga, taking the first place for "Colourful" and "Dawn by the Seaside". Entries from Tasmania and Perth took the prizes for "Novelty" and "Just a Beanie".

The main aim in having the festival was to encourage foot traffic into the gallery and this it did. The gallery is a showcase for local artists to display or sell their works. If you haven't visited the gallery why not walk through the doors on a Friday or Saturday between 10am and 2pm.

On August 14, the CEO of the Seafarers Mission is coming to the Culcairn Bowling Club to speak to Probus. He will return to Sydney with six extra-large suitcases of beanies.

Fischer program empowering locals

Now in its third successful year, the Fischer Community Leadership Program is once again open for applications.

Named in honour of former Deputy Prime Minister, the Hon Tim Fischer AC, the program has a simple yet profound mission: to enable and empower leadership within our communities, from the grassroots up.

The program will be deliv-

ered in Walla Walla and Urana from late August through to September and is open to anyone living in or with a connection to Federation and Greater Hume Councils.

The program supports locals to understand themselves in the broader context of their environment, equipping them with the skills needed to initiate and sustain community-led action.

The program is delivered as a hybrid, both in person and online, ensuring participants don't just learn about leadership in theory, but are provided the opportunity to test and practice it, too.

Program facilitator Mary Hoodless said the program provided an opportunity for real-world project development, alongside community members discovering their unique strengths and more about their personality types and leadership styles.

"Member for Albury Justin Clancy MP strongly advocates for the program, saying by empowering individuals to lead change in their communities, the program sets off a ripple effect of positive outcomes.

Community-led projects are

integral, with past participants achieving notable successes like arranging the festive season haybale decorations in Corowa, and establishing the Corowa Park Run," Mr Clancy said.

The program is an initiative of Fischer Community Leadership in partnership with Federation and Greater Hume Councils, auspice by the Border Trust and delivered by Alpine Valleys Community Leadership.

Harlan on path to independence

Harlan Candy is a 15-yearold boy who lives in Henty with his Mum Michelle, Dad Darren and sister Josslyn. Harlan loves loud cars, loud heavy metal music, playing the drums and the bass guitar, singing heavy metal songs, going to school, cooking, eating parmies, Richmond (until they started losing!), Harry Potter trivia and hanging out with his friends at The Next Step.

Harlan is also blind.

You may have noticed all the new paths around Ivor and Hayes Streets. Harlan had a lot to do with campaigning to get those paths. Harlan has been blind since he was about six so it was very hard for him to go anywhere independently because the footpaths were so uneven and



dangerous to walk along.

Using a cane, he needs guidelines or a "shoreline" to run his cane along a wall, a building, grass line or the edge of the path so you can walk in a straight line and feel if there is anything in your way. Harlan can now walk anywhere in Henty independently because of all those paths.

It is really sad for all the other vision impaired people that we have had in our community over the years, but really didn't know enough about making things accessible for them. Thankfully things have come a long way and making things accessible for all people is high on most people's agendas.

Harlan is in the process of applying for a guide dog, but needs to be able to travel two routes around Henty independently before he is ready for one. Harlan also needs to problem solve. If he gets lost he needs to be able to find a way to get back to a familiar If you see Harlan area. walking on his own say "hi Harlan" and tell him who you are, have a chat. He loves to chat, but please don't help him unless he asks. It is hard not to help him, but it is really important for him to learn to listen for cars, work out when it is safe to cross the road and do things independently. By all means intervene if you think he is in danger.

The laneways in Henty are a worry for Harlan as there isn't a lot of an indication for him to know that there is one. So, if you are driving out of a laneway or reversing out of your drive think of Harlan and have an extra look to make sure he's not walking past.

Harlan is an amazing young man who is more resilient than most, having to deal with lots of challenges every day of his life. He never complains – well not much anyway – and is normally a very kind, caring and happy young man. Do yourself a favour and next time you see Harlan make the time to stop introduce yourself and have a chat.

Annual Knit In held

A successful "Knit In" was held at the Henty Library last month. The staff provided a lovely lunch amid much chatter and the clicking of needles.

This is an annual event for Wrap with Love when wraps 100cmx180cm are sewn together from 25cm squares. The colours blend beautifully and are sent to the ordinator in Wagga Wagga and then on to Sydney where they are distributed around the world. This is a year-long project and in Henty where they have been knitting squares since 2003.

A total of 3,000 wraps have gone to Vietnam through Good Neighbours Australia. Also 3,000 have been sent to Bangladesh and 3,000 will be sent to Romania in September. A further 100 wraps have been distributed by Peppercorn Services for Aboriginals around the Hawkes-

bury area and 30 to Sister to Sister an organisation mentoring girls.

It has been good to see pictures coming from Syria of the 6,000 wraps being distributed to people in internally displaced camps. Presently, Australia Knitting for War Affected Kids is working with Wrap with Love to send 400 plus wraps to Syria.

The plan had been to have prawns with her daughter, but instead her SES alarm had sounded and the world appeared dark at 11am. There was fire at Silverdale. Robyn said that heroism is an act of stupidity that you got away with.

The local hall was still standing and lunch was tomato sandwiches with no trimmings, for the homeless, helpless and happy.

Warren presented the Probus pen to Robyn. She was thanked for a most thought provoking story.

Yvonne introduced archival films and Warren told how he had worked with Ken Hall of Cinesound and then Channel 9. Members saw advertising for cactoblastis caterpillars and then the need through World War 2 for 500 women to work towards sending food to the soldiers. There were the Otway ranges and Lorne advertised and then E.V.B. Sampson, Country Party candidate, introducing his family and telling us that he wanted to represent Australians in Parliament. There was the Mallee desert with trees removed to make a dust bowl and then Farmer Hoffmeyer who planted trees to save his farms from the dust storms.

From the National Film Archives came the 1915 Melbourne Cup, the opening of the Sydney Harbour Bridge and then the war in Australia and Kokoda front lines and the work of Damien Parer as he described our country being in peril.

Yvonne was thanked for her effort in providing the most interesting film footage.
