Bike plans making tracks

Progress has been made into developing a BMX and mountain bike track on the Henty Government Dam site and Henty Local Health Advisory Committee wants further input from future users.

Members of Henty LHAC met representatives of Greater Hume Council to begin developing plans for the site, which was originally regenerated by an enthusiastic band of volunteers more than 25 years ago. Henty LHAC identified more bike-riding opportunities as part of its target of providing more activities for young people from Henty and district.

The site has the potential to provide a suitable space for a BMX and general bike track and people who have previously shown interest in this idea or those who would like to now come on board are invited to have a say.

The Government Dam is located between the town silos and the Bucki Creek and can be accessed via the picnic area across from the Myoora Hostel.

Mick Broughan from Henty LHAC would like to hear from people who have ideas on what a track should feature and how to make it user friendly for all sorts of biking activi-

Are you eligible to become a JP?

Justices of the Peace (JPs) are volunteers appointed by the Governor of New South Wales. The primary roles of a JP are to witness a person making a statutory declaration or affidavit, and to certify copies of original documents. JPs come from all sections of the community and are available across NSW.

To be eligible for appointment as a NSW Justice of the Peace (JP), you must:

- be at least 18 years of age
- be nominated by a NSW Member of Parliament (MP)
- be an Australian citizen or a person who is entitled to vote at a general

- election for the Legislative Assembly
- be of good character
- not be an undischarged bankrupt.


So will you this year have a merry or Mary Christmas? Mary chose what is better. Will you?

Henty History — Part I of 3

A journey from Liverpool in England on December 5, 1858 to Melbourne in Australia on February 28, 1859 by David Renshaw, Bruce Whitlock's greatgreat-grandfather, scripted from his actual diary:



Leaving Liverpool on board the "Ocean Chief" David sailed through storms and roaring winds with waves running mountains high. It was a wretched time for women and children below deck, but worse for the men being drenched by waves and sliding on their backsides from one side of the ship to the other. The smashing of crockery until nearly all was broken, the doors and boxes banging, the constant shouting of orders allowed little time for sleep.

As the ship travelled into a warmer climate a great show of porpoises pranced by. Whales and birdlife were often seen. Albatrosses with 9-10 feet wing

spans hovered over the vessel and a huge iceberg one mile off the bow frightened the passengers as had it hit the ship in the dark all would have been lost.

At night the waves glided past the vessel with phosphorescent lights glowing in the moonlight. A beautiful sight were the great rocky cliffs projecting out of the sea while spectacular sunsets glowed at Tenerife where David hoped to post a letter home to Scotland.

The passengers thought there would be a mutiny after a fight broke out between the English, Irish and Scots. The captain however became involved and put four men in irons. A few days later a boat was lowered from the side of "Ocean Chief" because some Spaniards were selling oranges, nuts and figs which were very cheap.

The passengers enjoyed a plum pudding for dinner on Christmas Day and a first rate potato pie. They sailed with a fine breeze. It was a splendid panorama, sailing at 10-12 knots.

Services were held regularly by the captain and some passengers. Hymn singing was a great joy.

Travellers were wishing each other the compliments of the season though the rain came down in torrents during the hot and miserable day. The ship could only move at 7 knots.

On Monday January 2 "Ocean Chief" crossed "the line" so some steerage passengers had some fun making a donkey out of sheep skins, carried a lantern and went around the vessel singing "Speed Bonny Boat." The next day many

flying fish were seen. That night the captain, with some first class passengers, acted a play called "Belle the Barmaid', which caused much laughter.

After being scorched by the sun all day the passengers enjoyed an 8 knot breeze in the evening. The following morning David went on deck early to see the first mate throwing a rope overboard with a hook on the end holding a large piece of pork, 8 or 10 pounds in weight to catch a 9 or 10 foot shark. It took two hours for a successful outcome and all enjoyed the meal.

Other sights were whales, albatrosses and hundreds of other birds and an iceberg.

On the roughest night

since sailing "Ocean Chief" lost two sails on January 26 with main sails snapped in half, but two weeks later the vessel was becalmed for three days.

David's voyage continued with regular descriptions of the ocean, sea life, birds, ship's activities and sightings of other vessels and land. He always noted the knots per hour travelled and the services held on deck.

On February 23, Melbourne came into view so preparations for unloading carpetbag and boxes began. David was surprised to see tall buildings and long wide streets with hundreds of cabs driving up and down the city area. Things were very expensive and many were out of work. David stayed in Melbourne for one week before he headed for Sandy Creek.

Dashing fundraisers pass through

Perhaps we tend to take for granted that familiar sight in Henty; rain, hail or shine... our faithful postman in his high visibility vest delivering our mail on his trusty, distinctive red motorbike.

The Variety Postie Bike Dash constitutes six, hard days of riding for kids in need. The various Variety Postie Bike Dash goes off the beaten track, often off the bitumen, travelling through the bush and countryside, stopping in at rural towns and schools along the way.

Recently, a group of these riders stopped off in Henty for a lunch break before continuing the next leg of their journey.

This year, one of the participants, Dylan Smith took part in the fundraising event which began and ended in



Lilvdale, Victoria. stopped for a photo, appropriately, outside the Henty Post Office, riding for the 11th time in the event! All will have covered an impressive 1,500 kms. through Victoria and NSW regional areas by the time they returned home.

Over the past 10 years, the Variety Postie Bike Dash has collectively notched up well over 13 million kms: showcasing the enduring commitment of the 'Dashers' mounted on their CT110 postie bikes, that have come along for the rides, the participants having qualified, been approved... and paid a hefty registration fee. This event is staged every year: the routes located in various locations and areas, as is the epic Variety Bash for cars and their crews!

The Postie Bike Dash has raised more than \$2 million over the past decade for Variety - the Children's Charity NSW/ACT, and Variety hopes to raise \$250,000 from the 2024 event to support kids who are sick, experiencing disadvantage or living with a disability.










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Students help out

Australia's pioneer farm history to come alive

A pioneering spectacle is set to jump off the history pages in January when one of Australia's biggest private collections of vintage headers are fired up to harvest a southern NSW wheat crop.

In a scene reminiscent of the 1920s and 1930s, the working display of 27 tractor drawn vintage headers harvesting the wheat will be a sight current generations may have never witnessed.

Pleasant Hills farmer and vintage header collector Kerry Pietsch wants to give young, old, rural and urban people the chance to see, hear and smell living history.

Mr Pietsch said the Warrangong Vintage Harvest Day on Saturday, January 11 would be a one-off with no plans to hold it again.

"It will be a scene not witnessed in the Australian bush for generations and will give a unique insight into how our forefathers farmed a century ago," he said.

Kerry, as the principal of the Warrangong Heritage Collection Incorporated, is staging the vintage harvest day on his Pleasant Hills farm, as a follow up to his highly successful vintage harvest day held in February 2014.

The vintage harvest day will feature an array of restored

and working harvesters, winnowers, strippers, chaff cutters and tractors, harvesting a 15ha crop of the heritage wheat variety Ford.

His collection spans a stripper, headers and harvesters, including horse drawn, PTO and self-propelled machines – of every make and model, jockeying for space in an ever-increasing number of sheds.

The collection ranges from a horse-drawn 1902 David Shearer Maker's Mannum stripper to a 1980 John Deere 1051 PTO header and includes Kerry's favourite, a fully restored US manufactured Cockshutt once belonging to his uncle.

Kerry concedes he was born in the wrong era and enjoys nothing more than harvesting on a machine open to the elements.

The collection also includes a homemade header comprising a Gleaner crawler tractor converted to a harvester with planks of wood on the tracks to help with traction in wet conditions. It featured two gear boxes — one to drive the tractor and one to operate the harvester.

A centrepiece of the vintage harvest day will be a restored 1925 Sunshine Auto Header which was designed by Henty's own Headlie Shipard Taylor and marked its centenary in 2024 at the Henty Machinery Field Days.

With gates opening at 8am, the demonstrations will get underway at 9am.

"This day will be very special as 95 per cent of young people have never seen any of these headers operating," Kerry said.

"They only ever see modern machinery with airconditioned cabins — on these old machines you are sitting out in the dust, chaff and hot sun.

"Vintage machinery enthusiast Kevin Elphick will provide talks throughout the vintage harvest day, while lunch and refreshments will be for sale.

Entry fee is adults \$22, concession \$18, children 12 to 16 years \$10 and Under 12 free. Tickets available online or at the gate via card only.

an ephemeral wetland considered of high significance for supporting a wide range of endangered animal and plant biodiversity. While it currently is not holding water, many species of birds still visit during spring as part of their migration patterns.

The birds opposite were spotted in a 20-minute period during the October event.

Go and have a look for yourself. Enter the swamp via Henty Sandbank/ Swamp Road (behind Sweetwater) or, if you prefer to sit and watch, check out the bird hides which are accessed via the Henty Walla Road (turn into Diffeys Road and then Listers Lane – look for the signs).

They purchased two tickets for Harlan and gave them to him for his 16th birthday in August. Harlan said it was the best birthday gift ever. We then went back into the Arena and listened to "I Prevail" for 1.5 hours. We then met up with a mate of Baz's, Jimmy McRorie, who was also at the concert. We went to the Merch stall and I bought a Parkway Drive singlet for \$60. Then we went back in to listen to my all time favourite band, PARKWAY DRIVE!! It was AMAZING!!

"As I sat in my seat I could feel every drum beat IN MY BODY!! I could feel the heat off the fire coming from the stage. I could smell the gun powder from the flame crackers exploding on the stage. During the song "Darker Still" they opened the roof and it was raining lightly which was really cool!! Baz explained things to me as it happened because I can't see, and the coolest thing was the drummer was in a cage thing which spun around and he was inside it playing the drums, even when he was upside down!!

"I sang my heart out to every song. I could hardly talk by the end of the concert!! Baz and I had the best time I've ever had in my life!

"It was 12am when we got back to our apartment and I was very tired but it was very worth it!! Thank goodness Jimmy was there to drive us back to our apartment so we didn't have to



walk anymore!!

"We got up early and drove back home.

"Thank you, Baz and Dylan, and my Next Step family for the tickets to PARKWAY DRIVE, I will never forget it! Thank you to my amazing family, I had the best time ever! I have the greatest gift of having all you guys in my life!!"
