2025 HOLBROOK SHOW

Thank you to everyone who came along to the Holbrook Show last weekend, either as a competitor or just to have a look around.

The weather was kinder to us all than it had been in the days leading up to the annual show and the grounds were looking spectacular. The support received from the sideshow operators this year was certainly appreciated and created a good deal of excitement amongst the children.

Over in the cattle section, there were 18 cattle from seven different exhibitors over four breeds of cattle with Greg Schuller, Ashleigh Park Culcairn judging. Keajura Park from Tarcutta were very successful in the breeders group classes with their Black Limousins.

Exhibitors were full of compliments for the facilities & commented that it was a user-friendly local show. Some of those who were assisting exhibitors are keen to bring cattle themselves next year.

"Nabiac Union City" was both Junior & Grand Champion Bull, and "Lady Annie", owned by Scott Myers, was awarded Supreme Exhibit, with Holbrook Breeders sponsoring the award.

Winner of the Junior Paraders was Lani Lumsden, Morven.

Although horse entries were down on previous years, competitors were full of praise for the grounds. Feedback from one - "Sincere thanks to the Holbrook Show Committee & their team of volunteers and judges for yet another great show day. Thanks also to the wonderful sponsors whose generosity helps make it all possible."

Poultry entries were excellent, even with the challenges of the hot weather over preceding days. Entries of turkeys and geese attracted a number of curious children, and their parents.

In the pavilion, the very large number of entries from both primary schools and the Children's Centre created "good" challenges for our judges. Decorating biscuits to enter appears to be a popular activity with the younger children as well. A couple of members of the committee were also challenged with repairing a Lego entry which had not survived transportation - they finally called on the expertise of a much younger helper.









Organisers of the Championship Dog Show, held on Circus Flat, were also happy with how the day turned out. They had over 190 entries, many of which had travelled from out of the area to attend.

Thanks go to everyone who assisted with the running of the event, including our local community radio team, on the actual day and in both the preparation and packing up afterwards. A few of these people came along to enter items in the pavilion and ended up stewarding, and the assistance from the Basketball Club and Tennis Club members with various aspects of the event are certainly appreciated.

EASY ACCESS TO SO MANY BOOKS AT HOLBROOK LIBRARY

If you haven't called in to Holbrook Library in a while you may not know that you have access to so many books. Whilst there are many great new books on our shelves, with one simple click on your phone, you also have access to the books sitting on the shelves at the 22 Riverina Regional Library (RRL) branches.

All you need to do is download the RRL app to your phone. It is then so easy to search for the book you want.

If, for example, you are browsing books in a bookshop and find a book that appeals to you, simply;

- use the app to scan the book's ISBN and you will see if one of our branches has a copy
- · click Place Hold
- You will get an SMS message when your books arrive at the library

Maybe, you are listening to a book review on the radio and are keen to read this one. Simply search the title on your RRL app. Once again, click Place Hold and you will be notified when it arrives at Holbrook Library. If RRL does not have this book, using the app, you can make a purchase suggestion, requesting that RRL purchases a copy of this book.

This app is also an easy way for you to renew your books if you need to keep them longer. Other features of the app include being able to access the RRL eLibrary, find out library programs and events near you and see your account i.e. your current loans and reservations. You need to be a library member before you can access this app. It takes less than five minutes to join if you are not already a member. You can do this on the RRL website and then call in to Holbrook Library to pick up your member card. It is free to join the library. There are no fines for overdue books and it is free to reserve your books using the RRL app.

CONTRACTS BEFORE CARETAKER

Less than a week after announcing the pursuit of 100GL of water through an expression of interest process, the Labor Government has inked its first deal.

By comparison, it takes months for letters to be sent to people who have made offers through the open tender process and years to progress any infrastructure project.

Shadow Water Minister Perin Davey said the difference in capacity to deliver is astounding.

"A cynic may think they really are just pursuing water entitlement transfers in the fastest and easiest way possible.

"Or are they racing against the clock of a federal election, trying to get as many contracts signed as possible before entering caretaker mode?

"That is the only explanation as to how it is possible to exchange contracts under the EOI in less than a week when it takes up to six months to complete all the paperwork for a tender purchase.

"How can they have done all the analysis for value for money, social and economic impacts, and links to environmental outcomes?"

Corporate water investors Duxton Water today announced the sale of 30,614 ML of water in return for \$121.3 million from the Commonwealth.¹

"It is unclear which communities will be impacted by the sale. However, we know that many irrigators from South Australia and other key horticultural regions rely on Duxton's leasing and selling of temporary allocations to grow our food.

"If this water is all from the southern connected system, it will have a devastating impact on farm businesses that have evolved their operations to fit the modern water market.

"The Government needs to release their analysis of this sale, given the large volume and the potential impacts on the market and communities," Senator Davey said.

About 6,800 gallons of water is required to grow a day's food for a family of four. To create one pint of beer it takes 20 gallons of water.

Draft Native Vegetation Regulatory Maps – Is your land mapped correctly???

A statewide draft Native Vegetation Regulatory map is now available for landholder review. This map identifies sensitive and vulnerable land areas and determines what you can and can't do legally on your own land splitting it into category 1 (exempt) and category 2 (regulated) land classes. Now is the time to check this. These maps were created from a series of remotely sensed maps, so there is a chance that the vegetation on your land may not be correctly classified. Should you find an error there is a review process you can follow to get it updated. It is going to be easier to get it fixed now than after the review process ends (end date has not been specified).



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
